PRERREQUISITOS, CORREQUISITOS Y OTROS REQUIMIENTOS:	:	INGL 3222 is the second half of a two-part course that introduces students to literature through the study of the basic literary genres.		

## **DESCRIPCIÓN DEL CURSO:**

INGL 3222 focuses on the development of the literary genres of performance and poetry in Western culture from the Classical period to the twenty-first century. The course topics and representative works are discussed and developed totally in English.

This course will be offered under the face-to-face, hybrid and online modalities.

#### **OBJETIVOS DE APRENDIZAJE:**

- A. Through class participation in course activities student will:
- 1. Conceptualize literature as an expression of a given social, historical, moral, and cultural perspective
- 2. Develop critical thinking skills for the analysis of literary texts
- 3. Develop their knowledge of poetry and performance as art forms
- 4. Identify the salient characteristics of the genres of poetry and performance
- 5. Trace the historical development of poetry and performance as art forms
- 6. Analyze major topics explored in select works
- 7. Increase writing skills through paragraph, journal and/or essay writing
- B. Poetry: Using literary theories and other forms of analysis, students will identify and react in oral and written form to the following concepts:
- 1. Poetry as Identity
- 2. Poetry as History
- 3. Poetry as Critique of Social, Cultural and Political Issues

- Poetry and its Performance 4.
- C. Performance: Using literary theories and other forms of analysis, students will identify and react in oral and written form to the following concepts:
- Classical Structures of Performance 1.
- 2.
- Performance as Oral History

#### ACOMODO RAZONABLE

### REASONABLE ACCOMMODATION AND/OR MODIFICATION

The University of Puerto Rico (UPR) recognizes the right of students with disabilities to have an inclusive, equitable and comparable post-secondary education.
