Requisites This course is offered to students who have received

courses.

### Course Description

This course is designed for students of the Communications Department. It covers oral and written skills needed to produce and deliver effective speeches.

# Learning Objectives

At the end of the course the students will be able to perform satisfactorily in the following areas:

## Listening/Speaking:

- 1. Develop comprehension and critical listening skills
- 2. Produce the sounds and basic stress patterns of the English language
- 3. Improve articulation, enunciation, and pronunciation
- 4. Keep a record of the notes taken during the speeches
- 5. Respond to discussions and/or speeches of other students on specific topics

### Delivery/Conversation:

- 1. Detect and avoid distracting gestures and defects in vocal mechanisms
- 2. Recognize, control and reduce communication apprehension
- 3. Recognize strengths and weaknesses in the communication of others
- 4. Analyze, interpret, and respond to audience verbal and non-verbal communication
- 5. Deliver informal and formal oral presentations
- 6. Deliver speeches with ease and self-confidence

#### Writing:

- 1. Create outlines for speeches
- 2. Write scripts of the speeches that will be delivered
- 3. Write a listening log with feedback on the lectures of their peers

## Critical Thinking:

- 1. Use supporting materials and evidence
- 2. Understand and use appeals to logic, emotions, reliability and values effectively
- 3. Recognize and avoid logical fallacies in speeches

#### Research:

1. Acquire the necessary knowledge to investigate topics for the course speeches that will be delivered.
