Title Introduction to Creative Writing

Course Code INGL 3238

Contact Hours Three (3) hours per week/Three (3) credits

**Requisites** INGL 3101-3102, INGL 3103-3104, or level 4 o 5 on the advanced

placement examination (CEEB)

**Course Description** Theory and practice in writing fiction, poetry and drama are covered.

Detailed in-class criticism of student writing is also emphasized.

## **Learning Objectives**

At the end of the course the students will be able to:

- A. Compose several creative works such as poems, short stories, one-act plays and/or personal essays.
- B. Develop written critique and discuss in class their work and the work of others in a collaborative workshop atmosphere.
- C. Engage in and understand the concept of revision.
- D. Write a publishable creative writing text.
- E. Read and critically analyze several literary texts.
- F. Identify the basic elements of the different literary genres and apply those concepts to their creative work.
- G. Understand the concepts and the process of preparing and submitting a work for publication.

## **Course Outline and Time Distribution**

A. Introduction, course guidelines and writing assessment	2 hrs.
B. Discussion of workshop etiquette, pre-writing techniques	3 hrs.
C. Reading, analyzing and creating poetry	11 hrs.
D. Reading, analyzing and creating short stories	15 hrs.
E. Reading and writing drama and /or personal essays	9 hrs.
F. Development of a portfolio of revised work	3 hrs.
G. The presentation of a literary work (performance)	2 hrs.

# **Instructional Techniques**

A. The following strategies may be used to teach the course:

- 1. Active learning through writing exercises that include a variety of activities and styles to stimulate the creation of original work.
- 2. Peer reviews/workshop model includes sharing work, listening to and providing constructive criticism
- 3. Portfolio assessment allows students to assess their process as creative writers, as well as reflect on the importance of the revision process.

# **Learning Resources and Minimum Required Installations and Facilities**

The course content will be enriched by using library resources, digital technologies, multimedia/audiovisual materials, Internet resources, guest speakers, on and/or off campus literary and other cultural events and other supplementary materials that are prepared by the professor.

### **Evaluation Techniques**

Grades will not be assigned to student work since the object of the course is to appreciate the creative writing experience and improve on that experience through revision and peer review and critique. Students who attend class regularly, participate and complete all assignments and revisions satisfactorily will earn the highest grade. The best work will be the most original revised work which shows respect for the language and its conventions (grammar and punctuation.)
